Months later, this tragic episode has taken its place among myriad examples of how far life deviates from the way it's supposed to be. This event and others like it - planes turned into bombs, entertainment into carnage, education into massacre - reminds us with heartbreaking clarity that our world, for good or ill, is shaped by individual choices. Few of us will ever make a choice with such immediate and far-reaching implications as these, but we all make daily choices with consequences we can't foresee.

In this sense, we're much like Mary. Although she was given as clear an indication of God's will as anyone could hope for, exactly what would be required of her was something she couldn't possibly know. As she listened to the angel's words, surely she thought she understood just how costly a yes would be to her personally. She was engaged, and the price for unwed motherhood in the Jewish community was very steep. But the angel didn't lay out the coming years for her. She didn't know she'd have to watch her Son leave his family in pursuit of his Father's will; she didn't know that her yes meant she would someday watch her child - the child who would grow beneath her heart, nurse at her breast, and be raised to holy manhood — be crucified. Over the years, surely there were I moments when she questioned whether she'd entirely misunderstood God's message. And yet, in the end, it was her choice that opened the path to salvation for billions of people.

Our choices may seem petty by comparison, but that doesn't mean they're inconsequential. We choose what to watch on TV and what to eat or drink.

Shortly after the birth of my second child, who was diagnosed with Down syndrome in the delivery room, my husband and I received a letter. It was written by a man from our parish whom we didn't know very well. In it, he shared his experience as the parent of a grown daughter with Down syndrome.

My husband and I wept as we read his heartfelt words and the contents of the spiritual bouquet he promised to offer on our behalf. It was a moment of healing for us, a true touch of grace. From then until the day he died, he met us at the door of the church every Sunday with words of encouragement and snuggles for our daughter.

He has been gone for several years, but I think of him often, because I now speak to families who have received a diagnosis of Down syndrome. I never go into a conversation without praying to be a vessel of grace for these families the way this man was for me.

In this way, his memory remains alive. That's the beauty of the communion of saints. The dead can pray for us, and we can pray for them; but it's more than that. We remember those who went before us by imitating their example of holy living. From Thomas Merton we learn to find God in the stillness within our heart. Thérese of Lisieux taught us to view the tiniest sacrifices as opportunities to show our love for God. Blessed John Paul II showed us the sanctifying power of suffering.

But the giants, canonized or uncanonized, are not the only ones whose lives illuminate the path of holiness. The everyday saints who cross our paths often provide the most real examples to follow in daily living because their lives are just like ours. They, too, have mort-gages and overflowing calendars, irritating coworkers, and children who push their buttons and break their hearts. Yet somehow they seem to possess a peace nothing can take away. Remember that woman who never let a harsh or judgmental word cross her lips . . . the grandparents who recited the rosary every day without fail and used it to pass the time on road trips . . . the uncle who was never too busy to help repair a faucet or mow the lawn? The world is full of these "little s" saints. In quiet, unobtrusive ways, they inspire us by taking the same circumstances that feel overwhelming to us and use them as stair steps to heaven. What better way to honor their memory than to imitate their example?
